<u>Research Essay:</u> Much like the short essay, but this time students will need to produce an essay which defends a well-defined thesis statement. The essay will also need to compare two works from the syllabus, at least one of them from the second semester. Writing on the text you discussed for your short essay is prohibited. Furthermore, essays will have to cite at least three <u>peer-reviewed</u> sources which are not taken from the syllabus (i.e. you have to do your own research).

<u>Attendance and Participation</u>: In addition to attending class, students will sometimes be asked to perform small group assignments based on that day's lecture. These assignments are graded on a pass/fail basis – students who fail to meet the minimum requirements or who do not complete the assignment will be given a zero.
