ENGL 9131B THEMES IN CONTEMPORARY LIFE WRITING: VULNERABILITY & DISPOSSESSION

This seminar brings the relational turn in Caribbean, African-American and Black British life writing into dialogue with emerging discourses abou t vulnerability, dispossession, and justice. What, we will ask, is the critical yield of terms such as dispossession/ulnerability or abandonment/when set alongside contemporary life writing? To pursue this inquiry, we will analyze selected narratives, read essays on the relational turn in autobiography studies, and develop working genealogies of our key terms. Topics to be examined include: the 2010 Haitan earthquake, the historical legacies of slavery in the Atlantic world, the legal dispossessions and cultural dislocations of migrants, and the transnational afterlives of political struggle. We want to study why authors construct relational selves or adopt autobiographical subjects located within historically determined positions of vulnerability in order to rethink political futures.
