- 2. Determine appropriate assessment protocols based on sport, position, equipment availability and training setting (team or individual).
- 3. Appropriately perform a variety of fitness assessment protocols
- 4. Collect, interpret, and implement data from assessment protocols into a variety of training programs.
- 5. Perform general needs analyses for sport and specific positions within sport.
- 6. Generate a yearly training plan for athletes
- 7. Evaluate the scientific evidence regarding certain topics relevant to the course content.
- 8. Determine and apply appropriate coaching techniques based on individual athlete and team/sport requirements.
- 9. Able to use basic graphing and math functions in Excel

Absence from Course Commitments

Students must familiarize themselves with the Policy on <u>Academic Consideration –</u> <u>Undergraduate Students in First Entry Programs</u>

Examples of flexibility in assessment include when there are assessments not required for calculation of the final grade (e.g. 8 out of 10 quizzes), when there is flexibility in the submission timeframe (e.g. 72 hour no late penalty period), or when timed assessments (e.g., quizzes) are available over an extended period of time (e.g., when you are given a 72 hour time period to start – and finish – the assessment).

Please note that any academic considerations granted in this course will be determined by the instructor of this course, in consultation with the academic advisors in your Faculty of Registration, in accordance with information presented in this course syllabus. Supporting documentation for academic considerations for absences due to illness should use the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u> or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation by a health care practitioner.

Accommodation for Religious Holidays
