Policies in the School of Nursing are intende dudine standard processes and procedures for the program. All graduate programs within the Arthurbatt Family School of Nursing adhere to the University and School of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies (SCHRS) (Academic Policies and Procedures and SGPS Regulation in these policies, procedures and regulations, students in the graduate programs in the School of Nursing alsoere to specific Nursing program policies. In all situations, students have the right to appear or program decisions according to the duate Student Academic Appear bolicy.

## This policy will address:

- x Passing grades for program progression
- x Rewriting course assignments
- x Number of allowed course failures
- x Pre-requisite requirements for courses

### 1. Passing Grades for Progression

In order to remain and progress in graduate programs, students will need to achieve a passing grade of at least 70% overall in each course. Course grades and above are rounded up to the next whole number prior to determining progressions.

#### 2. Rewriting course assignments

# General Policy for Nursing Theory Courses

- x Eligibility for rewrites: Students in nursing theoryurses (those without a clinical, practice or experiential component) may rewrite a maximum of two (2) papers/assignments across the entire program, at the discretion of the course professor.
- x Maximum grade on rewrites: The highest grade achievable on any rewritten paper or assignment is 70%.
- x Rewrite denial: If a rewrite cannot help achieure overall course grade of 70%, the rewrite may be denied, resulting in course failure.
- x If a rewrite is used, the course prosteor will notify the grad program office

### Exclusions PHCNP Programs

x MN-PHCNP and PHCNP Diploma programs: Stsuitetttese programs are not allowed any automatic rewrites in any provincially delived courses including Pathophysiology, Roles & Responsibilities, Advanced Health Assessmedt Daiagnosis, Therapeutics and Integrative



### Policy for Elective Courses

- x Different schools/departments: When taking elective courses from outside Schools or Departments, students must adhere to the policies those respective uts. Each School or Department may have different policies.
- x Progression requirement: Regardless of where the course is offered, a grade of 70% or higher is required for progression in the School of Nursing.

In any instance, students may appeal evaluation or grade via the raduate Student Academic Appeals policy.

#### 3. Numbers of Course Failures

After one course failure, students are required to medith the appropriate lead faculty member (i.e., Program Faculty Lead, Academic Supervisor orolateoDirector, Graduaterograms) to discuss the student's learning plan to facilitate future successiumsing graduate studies. Required nursing courses must be repeated should a failure occur; it is not a requirement that specific electives be repeated, however students must still successfully complete total number of credits for their program.

Two course failures across all graduate courses taken during a student's program of study, whether required or elective, will result in automatic withdrawal from the program.

#### 4. Pre-requisite Courses

Students must select courses in accordance with the published requirements. Students are responsible for ensuring that their selection of courses ispacopriate and accurately recorded, that all course prerequisites have been successfully completed, co-requisite courses are in progress, and that they are aware of any anti-requisite course(s) that they have been. If the student does not have the requisites for a course, and does not have written special piession from their progranto enrol in the course, the University reserves the right to ancel the student's registration the course. This decision may not be appealed. The normal financial and academic tiessawill apply to a student who is dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.
