

Film 2230F Critical Reading and Writing for Film

Prerequisites: At least 60% in Film Studies 1020E or Film Studies 1022 or permission of the Department.

Course Description

This writing- *and* reading-intensive course prepares students to be better writers and readers while also asking students to reflect on the function of criticism itself. We will look at film

criticism over time, including its emergence out of print journalism; its professionalization within the university post-World War II; and, more experience of the control of the control
