The class format will consist of lecture and discussion. Discussion will be an important element of the course, so it is important that you stay on top of the reading and do some thinking about it before class. Course requirements include active participation, several short informal writing exercises, a short (4 page) paper, a longer (7 page) final paper, and a short-essay final exam. They are weighted as follows:
