First-year students should make sure their timetable includes the following:

5.0 1000-level courses - can be a combination of 0.5 credit (half-year) and 1.0 credit (full-

Western uses su xes (the letters on the end of course numbers) to designate di erent types of courses. Please pay close attention to su xes when enrolling in courses.

Do not select both the A and B (or F and G) sections of a course with the same course number. For example, do not select both Calculus 1000A and Calculus 1000B, as these are different sections of the same course of ered in the fall (A) and the winter (B).

- Begin by creating a conflict-free timetable for Schedule
 the fall and winter terms in <u>Draft My</u>
- Review our <u>First-Year Tips</u> for an overview of recommended courses by program
- Select electives based on your interests and strengths. Reac course descriptions in the
 <u>Academic Calendar</u> and review course outlines on departmental websites (<u>Social</u>
 <u>Science</u>; <u>Arts & Humanities</u>)
- Make sure you have at least 1.0 credits from outside the Faculty of Science. This can include 1.0 Social Science or Arts & Humanities credits, or 0.5 of each
- You can select up to 1.0 credits at the A liates, provided the same course isn't o ered on Western's Main Campus
 - Western's A liated University Colleges, Huron and King's, are smaller campuses within the larger Western community
 - You will know a course is o ered by an A liate because the section number will typically follow this pattern: 550 (Huron) or 570 (King's)

- Enroll in your courses using <u>Student Center</u> (Need help? <u>How to add/drop/swap courses</u>)
- While we encourage you to finalize your fall and winter timetables during the summer registration period, you can continue to make changes to your fall timetable until September 13, and until January 14 for winter-term half courses
- <u>Information on Advanced Standing credits</u> from IB or AP courses
- Adding courses to your enrollment cart does not complete the enrollment process. Make sure you go to your enrollment cart and submit your selections to finalize enrollment

Prerequisite	A course that must be successfully completed prior to registration for credit in the desired course.
Antirequisite	Courses that overlap su ciently in course content that both cannot be taken for credit.
Corequisite	A course that must be taken concurrently with (or prior to registration in) the desired course.
Constraint	A requirement that must be met to enroll in a course. These are noted in the "Requisites and Constraints" column in Draft My Schedule.

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As part of Western's graduation requirements, all students are required to complete 1.0 credits in each of the following three categories:

- Category A Social Science
- Category B Arts & Humanities
- Category C Science

While not all three categories need to be completed in first year, students in Science and Basic Medical Sciences are required to take 1.0 non-Science credits in their first year. This can be 1.0 Category A, 1.0 Category B, or 0.5 of each, and these must be at the 1000-1999 level. You can see which category each subject area falls into in the <u>Academic Calendar</u>.

To meet graduation requirements, all Western students must complete 2.0 <u>essay courses</u>. Essay courses are classes that require students to demonstrate competence in written assignments. At least 1.0 of the 2.0 required essay courses must be taken at the 2000+level. First-year students may wish to consider taking 0.5 or 1.0 essay credits at the 1000-level to work toward completing this degree requirement, but essay credits in first year are optional. You can tell which courses are essay credits, as they end in the su xes E (1.0 credit essay course), F (0.5 credit fall-term essay course), and G (0.5 credit winter-term essay course).
