3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will learn about concepts and mathematics of Short-Term Insurance: Coverages, loss reserving, ratemaking, reinsurance.

Construction and selection of parametric models:

- o Estimation: Maximum likelihood, method of moments, percentile matching and Bayesian procedure.
- o Variance and confidence interval of estimators.
- o Acceptability of fitted model: Graphical procedures and statistical tests.

Credibility theory:

- o Limited fluctuation credibility.
- o Bayesian approach in credibility.
- o Bühlmann and Bühlmann-Straub models.
- Exact credibility.
- o Empirical Bayesian in nonparametric and semi-parametric cases.

Simulation (time permitted):

- Inversion method.
- Estimation of the number of simulations with a given error and a given degree of confidence.
- o Use simulation to determine the p-value for a hypothesis test.
- o Use the bootstrap method to estimate the mean squared error of an estimator.
- o Apply simulation methods within the context of actuarial models.
