Modules 67 Dada and Surrealist Strategies in SI Practices

Dada and Surrealist avagarde strategies influence to SI namely, a critique against excessive bourgeois reification and rationality. For its part, the SI shared similar-graphe roots; yet, it also had a contentious relationship with both movember ause it sought to combine artistic production with a critical and dialectical form of social revolution that actualize and transcend both art and philosophy.
