Mr. Garrard provided an overview of the future fundraising objectives for Western detailed in Exhibit IV, Appendix 1.

Professor Carroll asked for clarification of the anomaly in the recommended goal associated with the Faculty of Science. Mr. Garrard stated that the experience in raising matching funds through the CFI program is such that very specific private sector partners donate to specific research projects. Professor Carroll asked what will happen should the donors not give the expected amount of money. Mr. Garrard explained that a "war chest" is set aside in the event that private sector funding cannot be secured.

The question was called and CARRIED.

#### S.04-216 Report on Applications, Confirmation Rates, Entering Averages and First-Year Grades

Dr. Moran presented the Report on Applications, Confirmation Rates, Entering Averages and First-Year Grades. Overhead slides used to highlight his presentation are attached as Appendix 2.

Senators engaged in a discussion about application procedures, grade inflation, and admission averages.

Professor Carroll asked why the first year grades in the Faculty of Arts are so much higher than those in the Faculty of Social Science and Science. He asked if this trend in grades for Arts students and Social Science students continues into the second and third years. He contended that the students in the Faculty of Social Science are at a disadvantage when competing for SSHRC-related scholarships because of lower grades. Dean Esterhammer agreed to investigate the situation to determine if Arts students have an advantage over Social Science students in competitions for SSHRC-related scholarships. Dr. Moran also asked the Chair of SCAPA to review this matter.




Western's Share of System Secondary School Applications

1999-00 to 2004-05




New Ontario Secondary School Applications to Western







Confirmation Rates of New Ontario Secondary School Applicants to Western who Received Offers
