**2006-07 University Operating and Capital Budgets**

*[Dean Pearson, Vice-Chair of Senate, assumed the Chair]*

It was moved by F. Longstaffe, seconded by D. Shrubsole,

That Senate provide advice to the Board of Governors, through the Vice-Chancellor, recommending the approval of the 2006-07 University Operating and Capital Budgets (Exhibit II, Appendix 1 - *red cover*).

Dean Pearson reminded Senate that the operating and capital budgets and setting of tuition fees are in the purview of the Board of Governors. The Senate may provide its advice to the Board under the authority of Section 30.(f) of the *UWO Act*.

Dr. Longstaffe provided an overview of the 2006-07 Operating and Capital Budgets. The presentation included the planning and budgetary context, details regarding the operating budget, priorities being addressed, faculty budgets, support unit budgets, student aid, major budget items, and a summary of the capital budget. Overhead slides used to highlight his presentation are attached as **Appendix 2** to these minutes.

Professor Carroll voiced concern about the transfer of funds from the Faculty of Social Science to other units as shown on page 73, Figure L, Expenditures less Revenue by Faculty. Dr. Davenport stated that Western is the first and may be the only university in Canada to make information available in budget documents concerning comparative program costing. Beginning in 1995, data have been provided showing revenues (tuition and grant) and expenditure by Faculty. Historically, grant funding has been dependent on assigned BIU rates, which are not consistently reflective of the cost of instruction. Other factors, such as enrolment (and enrolment-contingent funding from the University) have made it possible to approach a more stable equilibrium across the Faculties, but Social Science continues as a net revenue-generator.

Referring to Table 9 (page 52), Corporate Expenditures and Employee Costs, Professor Carroll noted that last year the University generated \$7.8 million more than needed to pay for the benefit costs and that the surplus has increased over the past five years. Mr. Chelladurai stated that the budget for employee benefits is allocated to the Faculties and recovered back. Recoveries are tracking at higher than projected levels due to rapid increases in the University's total base salary. To address this, the recovery rate for full-time employees is being reduced from the current level of 28.5% to 27.5% in 2006-07. The result of the reduction is that recoveries will be lowered by \$2.9 million in 2006-07.

Ms. Zener noted that students who receive continuing scholarships are not receiving an increase in funding to offset the increased tuition. Dr. Harris stated that it is not Western's practice to make inflationary adjustments to scholarships, but in the coming planning cycle a review will be conducted on appropriate scholarship levels for students with 90%+ averages given that these individuals are highly recruited by many institutions.

That effective May 1, 2006, the Dental Qualifying Program leading to a QP Certificate be withdrawn and replaced by a Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS) degree program for Internationally Trained Dentists, with the same program requirements

as the certificate program, but with the new title of DDS Program for Internationally Trained Dentists, and,

That students enrolled in the Certificate program as of May 1, 2006, and students admitted to the Certificate program for September 2006, be transferred to the new DDS Program for Internationally Trained Dentists, and,

That effective immediately for Fall/Winter 2005, students in the Certificate Program who are graduating in June 2006 graduate with a DDS.

**UWO Reputation in London**

Professor Carroll submitted a question about the results of the community survey regarding Western's reputation in London, particularly what the administration thinks should be done to improve the ways in which Western's strengths in the area of teaching and research can be made more relevant to the London community. Dr. Davenport said that Western receives good coverage in the local press on research in medicine and health; people are generally interested in these areas. It is more difficult to get coverage on scholarship in other disciplines. Ms. Pocius commented that Western's Communications Department is developing a community relations plan with the results of the communications survey serving as the benchmark.
