Registration in a Visual Arts module.

This course introduces students of art history and museum & curatorial studies to some of the basic digital tools required for professionals in the field. The course will cover skills including photo and video documentation, image optimization for printing and online distribution, and graphic design for materials like posters and exhibition catalogues. It will also offer an introduction to 3D exhibition planning in SketchUp and setting up blogs and websites on platforms like WIX. In tandem with these practical skills, the course will also touch on best practices and strategies for exhibition planning and promotion and review some important copyright considerations in the context of curatorial practice.

- Introductory working knowledge of some essential digital tools used by arts professionals for the planning, documentation, and promotion of exhibitions and displays
- Poster design research 5% – Due date: February 6th
- Poster design 25% – Due date: February 13th

- Sketchup 25% – Due date: March 12th
- Website or blog 10% – Due date: April 2nd

- Attendance and participation:
 - Active participation in class discussions, workshops, and technical demos.
 - Asking questions in class or one on one, sharing examples and ideas during class discussions, and offering constructive feedback to peers.
 - Doing requested research and coming to class prepared for all technical demos, workshops, project critiques, and discussions.
- Course projects, technical demos and workshops:
 - Attention to detail and commitment to meeting all the technical requirements for both in-class software demos and course projects.
 - Demonstrated effort to learn new technical tools and resolve technical challenges.
 - Willingness to seek technical advice and support when needed.
 - Ambition, resourcesfulness, problem-solving, and ability to engage in independent research.

It is expected that assignments are completed by their due date and are available and prepared for in-class critique and discussion. If the student notifies the instructor prior to the due date about a reasonable delay in handing in the assignment, extensions can be given at the instructor's discretion. If an extension is granted, the instructor will deduct 5% per day from the assignment grade. After 5 days, the assignment will no longer be accepted without Academic Consideration. 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The University recognizes that a student's ability to meet their academic responsibilities may, on occasion, be impaired by medical illness. Illness may be acute (short term), or it may be chronic (long term), or chronic with acute episodes. Academic Consideration provides students with consistent, fair, and pedagogically appropriate consideration, without compromising the academic integrity of the course or program, when they have been unable to complete some component of a course due to short-term extenuating circumstances. Students who have long-term or chronic medical conditions (physical or mental) that may impede their ability to complete academic responsibilities are directed to seek Academic Accommodation through Accessible Education ([Academic Accommodation for Students with Disabilities](#)).

The University further recognizes that medical situations are deeply personal and respects the need for privacy and confidentiality in these matters. However, in order to ensure fairness and consistency for all students, academic consideration for work representing 10% or more of the student's overall grade in the course shall be granted only in those cases where there is documentation indicating that the student was seriously affected by illness and could not reasonably be expected to meet their academic responsibilities.

Documentation shall be submitted, as soon as possible and no later than 48 hours after the end of the period of absence covered, to the Academic Counselling unit or Dean's Office of the student's Home Faculty together with a request for relief specifying the nature of the academic consideration being requested. These documents will be retained in the student's file, and will be held in confidence in accordance with the University's [Official Student Record Information Privacy Policy](#). Once the petition and supporting documents have been received and assessed, appropriate academic consideration shall be determined by the Dean's Office in consultation

expected to complete their academic responsibilities. (Note – it will not be sufficient to provide documentation indicating simply that the student “was seen for a medical reason” or “was ill.”)

Whenever possible, students who require academic consideration should provide notification and documentation in advance of due dates, examinations, etc. Students must follow up with their professors and their Academic Counselling office in a timely manner.

A Western Student Medical Certificate (SMC) is required where a student is seeking academic consideration. This documentation should be obtained at the time of the initial consultation with the physician/nurse practitioner or walk-in clinic.
